## The Curator's Notebook

Since I began at the Dorset Historical Society Bley House Museum, my main charge has been getting to know the collection, which encompasses all that is on exhibition and all that is in our collection storage areas. This is a complex and multi-layered process that will be ongoing for some time and as I progress I continue to be impressed by the scope of the collection and the diversity of histories represented it. I have a passion for collections as I think all curators do so although I find the work challenging it is also a great pleasure. I am learning all the time and hope that ultimately my work will add a new dimension to the collective memory of those who live in Dorset and those who visit.

I am approaching this learning curve in three different ways: by keeping up with new acquisitions; by launching a complete inventory of the collection; and by undertaking new exhibitions for some of the galleries. Exhibitions involve extensive research but finally putting them together and installing them is a very creative effort because it involves the interpretation of the materials, which hopefully provides meaning for many different audiences.

During 2008, we had approximately seventy donations to the collection. All have been important but I will mention a few here that I think speak particularly to the "diversity" in our acquisitions. We received from the Berkshire Bank a large framed 1856 Rice and Hardwood map of Bennington County with insert maps of towns and villages, engravings of important buildings and landmarks, statistical data and a business directory by town. A large gravestone rubbing of Henrietta Jackson Hamlin's marker in Istanbul, Turkey given by the Hamlin family biographers, Malcolm and Marcia Stevens, inspired me to put together a small exhibit in the Main Gallery about this fascinating Dorset woman and her family. And Sue Washburn and I have been researching a treasure trove of letters and photographs that came to us from Sara O'Brien, the great great granddaughter of Samuel E. Rideout. He was born in Dorset, served in the Civil War and finally moved with his family first to Chicago and then to Ohio. His two daughters served at the Santee Mission in Nebraska, which was dedicated to the Mandan Sioux people of the area.

The complete inventory of the collection could take well over a year but in the long run it will provide valuable information and give us an opportunity to improve the way the collection is being stored. Many items will be re-housed in archival sleeves and boxes and this will be a good time to develop a conservation schedule for our significant regional paintings. One of our finest paintings, "Church Street – Dorset" by Edwin B. Childs, circa 1925, will be cleaned before the summer exhibit planned in conjunction with the hundred year anniversary celebration of the present United Congregational Church of Dorset and East Rupert.

I am privileged to be working with Kathie Wall Evans on our largest new exhibit for the 2009 season, which will focus on the artistry of Jessica Bond. Kathie was a longtime friend and protégé of Jessica's. The opening reception for the exhibition will be on Friday, May 29<sup>th</sup>, from 5:00-7:00 with a gallery talk by Kathie.

### Cataloging the Collection

The Dorset Historical Society now has over 5000 items in the museum collection. New acquisitions are accessioned and cataloged as they are received, and previously acquired artifacts are currently being cataloged and entered in a PastPerfect database computer system. Data entry has now been completed for over 2500 items, and over 1300 of these have been entered in the catalog, or detailed portion, of the system.

This collection description and tracking process (accessioning, cataloging and computer entry) will be continued until the entire holdings of the museum (objects, photographs, documents, books, etc.) have been reviewed and documented. It is a time consuming but rewarding undertaking. If you are interested in joining in this necessary endeavor, please contact our curator, Susanne Rappaport, for details on how you can help.

## Genealogy Workshop

**Kick off spring with our second seminar for 2009: "An Introduction to Family History"** with Linda French. ## *Miles Bowen on Historic American Paint colors*

**A**t two seminars in February, the Dorset Historical Society presented **Miles Bowen of Luxbrush Painting Co. of Manchester**, an expert in paint restoration, who joked that he's "had a colorful life." His subject was "Historic Colors in American Paint." Bowen's discussion included the history of color going back to the Romans and Egyptians as well as the concept of the color palette.

Closer to the contemporary scene, he explored the question of accurately matching the colors and texture of historic American finishes.

In his second program, Bowen examined the raw materials that went into American paints in earlier times and their sources, the content of those materials, and whether they can be replicated today. During the hands-on component of both seminars, participants worked on an individual sample board to produce a distressed finish, first choosing a color series to use, and painting on a base coat. At the subsequent meeting seminar-goers applied the final steps of distressing and glazing to their samples.

These seminars may be repeated at a later date if there is sufficient interest. Please call the Historical Society for more information.
